From the Pastor

A preacher described that his first recollection of any mention of Christ's second coming went back to when he was six or seven years old. His grandfather was taking him somewhere in his 1949 Hudson. It was getting close to Christmas, close enough that he had already made the longings of his heart known to Santa Claus. He was hoping for a shiny red bicycle, with chrome fenders, and plastic streamers on the handlebar. His parents had even assured him that they thought Santa might bring that bicycle because he had been a good boy. In his mind the plans for the bike were complete. Nothing else to do but wait.

As they rode along his grandfather frequently would lean forward toward the windshield and look up into the sky in front of them. The sky was mostly clear and bright with stars and a nearly full moon. "Look," his grandfather said, "look at the moon." It had a pinkish hue and around it a rather hazy looking ring. It seemed strange and eerie. His grandfather continued, "When the moon looks that way, I wonder if it's time for the rapture?"

"What's a rapture?" he asked him. His grandfather explained, "When Christ will come again and take us all to be with him in heaven. Jesus said there would be signs in the sun and moon and stars. Maybe this is one of them." The boy sat quietly for a while after that. And, he thought to himself, "Lord, if you really are coming again, could you please wait until after Christmas?"

As we begin the season of Advent, the message is not new. We've heard it all our life – Jesus will return and so we have to be prepared. And we have no more success now than the first disciples did in learning what the timetable will be. Our attitude toward Advent usually is that the Lord is coming, but hopefully not yet.

Two men were working in the field. Two women were grinding at the mill. In both cases one was taken, the other remained. Were the ones taken now gone because they were ready to go? Did the ones left behind

remain because their work was not yet completed? The parables could be interpreted either way, for we are not given the knowledge to interpret how God decides.

The key to our preparation for the return of Jesus is to remember what we will celebrate soon – with the coming of Christ into our world, always and everywhere, God is with us. His presence is so real that we cannot focus so much on what is to come that we lose sight of how necessary all the everyday things and situations are in preparing us for eternal life.

It will be wonderful to celebrate Christmas by giving loved ones just the perfect gift – we're already thinking about what it should be. But, this weekend we begin gathering gifts from the requests on the Angel Trees. We will not see the face of the child who receives our gift, but our act of generosity will help that child know they are remembered and blessed by God's loving care, just as we are.

It will be wonderful when we get to heaven and the peace and joy of being with God is ours. But during this season, as we sing about peace on earth, perhaps it is time for us to give up the memory of a past offense leave behind the burden of resentment we carry.

It will be wonderful one day to see God face to face. But he is always giving us glimpses – in the face of a loved one and in the face of a stranger, in the face of a friend, and in the face of someone we do not like. Perhaps our daily work during this Advent should be to look for Christ in each person, and treat them with the same respectful reverence that we will one day give to the Lord when he comes.

The Lord will return at a time we do not know. And it seems that the correct preparation is doing the best we can at the ordinary things of life. We know that we are not ready yet for his coming. That is why there are still four more weeks of Advent remaining. Time to get to work!

(LITURGIA DE LA PALABRA.)

Lectura del santo evangelio según san Marcos 13,33: "Estén preparados y vigilando, ya que nos saben cuál será el momento". Palabra del Señor. (Breve pausa para meditar)

Guía: Vigilar significa estar atentos, salir al encuentro del Señor, que quiere entrar, este año más que el pasado, en nuestra existencia, para darle sentido total y salvarnos.

(ENCENDER LA VELA)

Guía: Encendemos, Señor, esta luz, como aquel que enciende su lámpara para salir, en la noche, al encuentro del amigo que ya viene. De El Pastor

Un predicador describe lo que recuerda de la primera vez que hablo de la segunda venida de Cristo, cuando tenía más o menos seis o siete años. Su abuelo lo llevaba algún lugar en su Hudson de 1949. Se acercaba la Navidad, estaba lo suficientemente cerca que ya había hecho los anhelos de su corazón conocido a Santa Claus. Esperaba una bicicleta roja, con la defensa cromada, y plástico en los cuernos. Sus papas inclusive le habían asegurado que probablemente Santa le traería la bicicleta porque había sido un buen niño. En su mente los planes de la bicicleta era un hecho. Nadamas era esperar.

Cuando iba a lado de su abuelo, frecuentemente inclinaba su cabeza a la ventana y miraba al cielo. El cielo estaba claro y brillante con estrellas y casi luna llena. ¡Mira! dijo su abuelo, "Mira la luna." Tenía un tono rosado y alrededor un anillo que se veía nebuloso. Parecía extraño y misterioso. Su abuelo continuó, "Cuando la luna se ve de esa manera, me pregunto ¿si es tiempo para el rapto?"

¿Qué es un rapto? le pregunto. El abuelo le explico, Cuando Cristo vuelva y nos lleve con Él al cielo. Jesús dijo que habría señales en el sol, la luna y las estrellas. Probablemente este es uno de ellos. ... El niño se quedó callado por un rato. Pensó, Señor, si en realidad vas a venir, podrías espérate hasta después de navidad.

Al iniciar la temporada de Adviento, el mensaje no es nuevo. Lo hemos escuchado toda la vida, Jesús regresara y tenemos que estar preparados. No hemos tenido más suerte ahora que los primeros discípulos en aprender el tiempo que pasaría. Nuestra actitud sobre el adviento usualmente es que el Señor viene, pero ojala que aún no.

Dos hombres trabajaban en el campo. Dos mujeres estaban moliendo en el molino. En ambos casos uno se fue, y el otro se quedó. A los que se llevaron, ¿era porque estaban listos para irse? Los que se quedaron era porque aún no completaban su trabajo. La parábola puede ser interpretada de ambas maneras, porque no se nos ha dado

la sabiduría de interpretar como Dios decide.

La clave de nuestra preparación para el regreso de Jesús es recordar lo que vamos a celebrar, con la venida de Cristo al mundo, por siempre y en todas partes, Dios está con nosotros. Su presencia es tan real que no podemos enfocarnos mucho en que es lo que vendrá, que perdamos de vista lo que es necesario en todos los días y en cada situación para prepararnos para la vida eterna.

Sería maravilloso celebrar la Navidad dando a nuestros seres querido el regalo perfecto, ya hemos pensado en que podrá ser. Este fin de semana tomamos los ángeles del árbol de Navidad. No veremos el rostro del niño que recibirá nuestro regalo, pero nuestro acto de generosidad le ayudara al niño a saber que Dios se acuerda y los bendice con un amor cariñoso, así como a nosotros también.

Sera maravilloso cuando lleguemos al cielo y la paz y el gozo de estar con Dios sea de nosotros. Pero durante esta temporada, al cantar sobre la paz en la tierra, seria buen tiempo para dejar las ofensas del pasado y dejar el resentimiento que cargamos.

Sera hermoso un día ver Dios de cara a cara. Sin embargo siempre nos permite verle en el rostro de un ser querido, en el rostro de un extraño, en el rostro de un amigo, en el rostro de alguien que no queremos. Tal vez nuestro trabajo diario durante este Adviento podría ser mirar a Cristo en cada persona, y tratarlos con la misma reverencia y respeto con la cual trataríamos al Señor cuando venga.

El Señor volverá en un tiempo que no conocemos. Parece ser que la preparación correcta es hacer lo mejor que podamos en las cosas ordinarias de la vida. Sabemos que no estamos preparados para su venida. Es por eso que aún hay cuatro semanas de Adviento. Es tiempo de ponerse a trabajar...
