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# Overview Of Confirmation

## What is Confirmation?

Confirmation is the sacrament instituted by Christ in promising to send the Holy Spirit (Jn 14:15-21) and attested to in the early Church (Acts 8:19), in which the Bishop or priest appointed by him invokes the gift of the Holy Spirit upon a baptized person and anoints them with holy chrism; the effect of which is the increase and strengthening of the grace the person received at their baptism.

## What are the effects of the Sacrament of Confirmation?

- It roots us more deeply in our identity as true sons and daughters of God our Father.
- It unites us more firmly to Christ
- It increases the gifts of the Holy Spirit (wisdom, understanding, knowledge, courage, right judgment, piety, & wonder and awe of the Lord) in our hearts.
- It binds us more perfectly to the Church which is Christ's Body.
- It gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and defend the faith in word and action as true witnesses of Christ, to confess the name of Christ boldly, and never to be ashamed of the Cross.

## Why do we prepare for Confirmation like this?

*“Preparation for Confirmation should aim at leading the Christian toward a more intimate union with Christ and a more lively familiarity with the Holy Spirit—his actions, his gifts, and his biddings—in order to be more capable of assuming the apostolic responsibilities of Christian life. To this end catechesis for Confirmation should strive to awaken a sense of belonging to the Church of Jesus Christ, the universal Church as well as the parish community. The latter bears special responsibility for the preparation of confirmands.”*

Catechism of the Catholic Church #1309

All the elements of our confirmation program are intended to be means through which our students are led “toward a more intimate union with Christ and a more lively familiarity with the Holy Spirit” so that they may be “more capable of assuming the apostolic responsibilities of Christian life.”

Service projects, retreats, prayer & devotional practices, attending Mass every week; all of these things are asked of our students with the above goal in mind, because it is through these channels that we grow closer to God who transforms us into saints!

# *Shift Conference Parent Letter*

Dear Parents,

St. Monica is pleased to announce that the 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Confirmation retreat is St. Monica's Shift Conference. It will take place August 25-27, 2017 at Sky Ranch in Van, Texas. Check in will be at St. Monica on Friday at 5:00 pm and we will return on Sunday at 1:00 pm.

The theme of our Conference this year is Genesis. The weekend will focus on new beginnings in our relationship with God and living the Gospel.

Approximately 370 students will be attending the Conference between St. Monica School's 8<sup>th</sup> grade students and St. Monica's Faith Formation students who are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. There will also be opportunities for everyone to gather collectively for Mass, go to Confession, and listen to keynote speakers. Our main keynote speaker this year are Fr. Leo Patalinghug; Diocese of Dallas Youth, Young Adult, and Campus Ministries Director, Jason Deuterman; St. Monica's Youth and Young Adult Director, Jason Trujillo; Diocese of Dallas Director of Vocations, Fr. Edwin Leonard; St. Thomas Aquinas Associate Director of Youth Ministry, Meagan Barras, among others.

We will be taking one Safe Environment cleared adult for every seven students to the Conference. This includes small group leaders, staff members who are going on the Conference, and a medical doctor. There will be nine small groups from the school consisting of four adult males and five adult females.

The main responsibility of a small group leader is to lead group discussion, maintain their group together throughout the Conference and supervise students in the evening. Small group leaders will be sleeping in the same cabins as their small group. More than one small group is assigned to a cabin, and cabins are also gender specific. For the sake of bonding, sharing and fellowship, small groups are gender and grade specific and students from the school will only be placed with other students from the school for their small group assignments. Parents are welcome to participate as small group leaders, but will not be assigned to their child's small group.

Parents who volunteer must also attend a mandatory training on August 13<sup>th</sup> and must have their badge renewed by this date. If you are a parent who would like to serve as a small group leader, you may register on the parish website under Youth and Young Adult Ministry which will take you to the L1ft Youth Ministry website or go directly to [www.L1ftministry.org/volunteer](http://www.L1ftministry.org/volunteer).

Students may bring a cell phone for the bus, but ALL phones will be given to the small group leader at the start of the conference. In addition to the programming of the conference, students will have free time, where they will have the opportunity to participate in various outdoor water and ropes course activities all under the supervision of certified and paid staff from Sky Ranch.

# *Shift Conference Parent Letter*

Parents should register their youth for the Shift Conference by August 6th on St. Monica's website under Youth and Young Adults or at [www.L1FTministry.com/retreats](http://www.L1FTministry.com/retreats). A confirmation fee of \$175, which incorporates the cost of the retreat and other expenses related to Confirmation will be billed through FACTS. After registering online, parents will be asked to fill out a diocesan permission form which is submitted online. Parents must also fill out a permission form from Sky Ranch available at our parent meetings. This form must be submitted to the parish office by the end of May.

We are confident that our youth will have an amazing spiritual and bonding experience at St. Monica's Shift Conference. We look forward to ministering to them and bringing them closer to Christ this weekend as they prepare for a life long journey with Christ and His Church through the Sacrament of Confirmation.

## *Frequently Asked Questions*

### **Where and how far is Sky Ranch from St. Monica?**

Sky Ranch is located in Van, Texas, an hour and fifty minutes southeast of Dallas near Tyler, TX.

### **How much is the Conference and how will I pay?**

The cost of the Conference is \$175. Families will be billed through FACTS and will be notified prior to being billed.

### **How do and when do I register?**

Registration is done online at: at [www.L1FTministry.com/retreats](http://www.L1FTministry.com/retreats). August 6<sup>th</sup> is the deadline to register.

### **Is it a requirement for a child to attend a Confirmation retreat? What happens if my child cannot make it?**

All youth in the diocese of Dallas are required to attend a Confirmation retreat. If a child is not able to make it to their own parish retreat, they must find a retreat at another parish. Families are responsible for looking for another retreat and making sure that Mariangela Byrne gets a letter stating their son or daughter attended a Confirmation retreat elsewhere.

### **How come some parish Confirmation Retreats are shorter or longer than St. Monica's retreat?**

Every Confirmation program offers a retreat but each parish sets their own requirements with regards to length and format. Some parishes have day retreats, others have overnight retreats. This is left up to the discretion of the pastor and his youth ministry team. At St. Monica we want to provide the best spiritual experience for the students.

# *Frequently Asked Questions*

## **What items should my child pack on the Conference?**

Youth should bring a sleeping bag or sheets, pillow, toiletries, towel, casual clothing, insect repellent, sunblock, swimsuit, tennis shoes, short/jeans. Youth should also pack a Bible and a rosary.

## **How many meals will be provided? Can my child take snacks?**

Dinner will not be provided on Friday evening. All students must come already having had dinner. Students may pack a sandwich and snacks to eat on the bus on Friday evening. Snacks and water will be available on the bus. All three meals will be provided for on Saturday and breakfast will be provided on Sunday, but Sky Ranch will not serve lunch on Sunday. Students will arrive at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday.

## **My child takes medications. How will they be administered?**

A slip of paper will be go home with your student. We ask that you please fill out a medicine slip with name of medicine, dosage, and how often youth is to take medicine. Parents must sign slip. A doctor will be in charge of making sure medicines are given when they are supposed to be administered.

## **How well are students being supervised at night to ensure students do not sneak out of their cabin?**

Each cabin has a loud door alarm that goes off when a person exits the cabin. Also, different core team members will be patrolling the cabins at night to ensure students do not roam. Cell phones will be confiscated at the beginning of the Conference to avoid having students plan an outing during the night.

## **What if my child has food allergies? Will Sky Ranch provide special meals for them?**

Yes, Sky Ranch provides meals to students with food allergies.

## **I am concerned about the age difference between high school and middle school students. How is this dynamic being addressed?**

To comply with safe environment requirements, we will have one adult for every seven students or fifty-one safe environment cleared adults. Students will always be supervised by these adults. Small group leaders have been instructed to remain with their small groups at all times. High school and middle school students will be together for Mass, adoration, and during the main sessions but will be separated by age for breakout sessions. High school and middle school students attended last year's conference and no issues were reported.

## **Will my child be sleeping in the same cabin as students from another school?**

Small groups will sleep in the same cabin together. Some cabins are larger than others and may have more than one small group. It is possible that a school small group will be placed in the same cabin with a parish small group. Older high school student small groups, however, will not be sleeping in the same cabin with a cabin assigned to 8<sup>th</sup> graders.

# *Frequently Asked Questions*

## **Will my child have access to their cell phone?**

One purpose of the retreat is to disengage from the normal activities and this involves disengaging from cell phone usage. Student cell phones will be collected when we arrive at Sky Ranch and will be returned on Sunday. In case of an emergency, parents may contact Sky Ranch directly.

Adults will be monitoring screen time when students are on the bus to make sure inappropriate material is not being watched. Should an issue arise, phones may be confiscated on the bus.

## **I would like to go on the Conference but do not want to serve as a small group leader. What else may I do?**

At this time, we are only looking for small group leaders for the school. We are needing 4 female leaders and 5 male leaders. Adults interested in serving as small group leaders must apply and attend a mandatory training on August 13<sup>th</sup>.

All small group leaders must be fully initiated, practicing Catholics, in order to lead a small group.

## **Must I attend the training on August 13th to serve as small group leader?**

Yes, it is required to attend the training in August to know what to do on the Conference. A safe environment renewal class will be offered from 1- 2 p.m. and training for the Conference will be from 2 - 5 p.m.

## **If I am small group leader can I drive my own child to the Conference?**

No, all students and volunteers must ride on the bus.

## **Is there an itinerary I can preview? What are the talks focused on?**

An itinerary will be provided on our L1ft's website which can be found under Youth and Young Adult Ministry on St. Monica's church website [www.stmonicachurch.org](http://www.stmonicachurch.org) or at [www.l1ftministry.com/retreats](http://www.l1ftministry.com/retreats)

## **Does my child need to bring money with them to the Conference?**

Sky Ranch has a convenience store where students may purchase snacks and souvenirs. We recommend students not bring more than 30 dollars.

## **What time and where do students need to be dropped off on Friday?**

Students must be dropped off at 5:00 pm by the football field from there students will be walking over to the Cafeteria where the buses will be waiting for them to be picked up and taken to Sky Ranch.

# *Saint Project & Presentation*

## **What is the requirement for the Saint Project?**

You should research and choose a saint to be your patron who you can connect with and whose name will be used for you at Confirmation. You should then create a project in order to learn about and teach others about your chosen saint. This project can be a written report, Power Point presentation, short film, poster or display board, costume w/ monologue, or some other creative project. You will then present your saint project in class and to elementary school children. Lastly, you should fill out the Saint Profile in your Confirmation Record Booklet.

## **Why must I choose a Saint for Confirmation?**

One of the traditional practices at the time of Confirmation within the Church in the United States is to choose a saint to be one's patron and spiritual role model. All candidates should research and choose a saint with whom they have a connection. This saint should become someone you can learn about, ask for their prayers and intercession, and strive to emulate as a fellow member of the Body of Christ. You will put together a project of your choosing where you will be able to learn about and teach others about your saint which you will present to the parish community in November.

## **What information should be covered in my project?**

Each project should incorporate and answer the following questions in some way:

1. What is your saint's name?
2. When is their feast day?
3. Give a brief summary of their life.
4. What are some things they are well known for?
5. How/why did they become a saint?
6. What things are they the patron saint of?
7. What traditions or practices are associated with this saint?
8. Why is this saint important to Catholics?
9. Why did you choose this saint?
10. How do you hope to be more like your saint?

## **Saint Profile**

Once you have completed and presented your saint project, you are to fill out your Saint Profile in your Confirmation Record Booklet. Your Confirmation Record Booklet should be turned into the Confirmation teacher when she announces the due date.

## **What else do I need to know?**

- After Saint Project is done, students should fill out the Saint Profile in their Record Booklet.
- The name of the Saint you choose will be the name used for you at Confirmation.
- Any form of the name of Jesus or a title associated with him (such as *El Niño de Atchoa*) is considered inappropriate.
- Girls may choose a male Saint and vice versa.

# *Spiritual Practices & Devotions*

## **What is the requirement for spiritual practices & devotions?**

Using the chart provided in your Confirmation Record Booklet, *strive* to do at least 1 spiritual practice or devotion per day either individually or as a family and keep track of how many and which ones you do by utilizing that chart.

## **Why am I asked to participate in spiritual practices and devotions?**

**“The objectives for Confirmation preparation begin with a commitment to prayer, community involvement, and a search for deeper faith through continuing study and reflection.”**

### **Diocese of Dallas, Catechetical Policies**

This is accomplished through regular religious education classes and retreat experiences, but also through individual, family, and community experiences of prayer and living our Catholic Faith.

Therefore, during this time of preparation, you are encouraged to seek out and participate in both new and familiar spiritual devotions and practices to help you develop your spiritual life and relationship with God.

## **How do I keep track of this?**

In your Confirmation Preparation Record Booklet you will find a chart listing many common spiritual practices and devotions. Use this chart as a means of keeping track of your participation and spiritual growth throughout the year. Every time you participate in one of the listed activities, mark off a box in that row. By the end of the preparation process, you will have a visual representation of your spiritual growth and, hopefully will have discovered some new forms of prayer that you enjoy and will continue to practice regularly.

## **How many do I have to do?**

The simple answer: Enough to grow closer to God. And since we can *always* be closer to God than we currently are, this should be something you do on an ongoing basis, both now and for the rest of your life. **Maybe set a goal to try everything on the list at least once.** Find out which ones really help you feel closer to God and do those as often as you can.

# *Spiritual Practices & Devotions*

## **How will I be held accountable for doing these?**

During your classes at the church or school, you will be given time to share with your friends how these experiences have had an affect on your life, which ones you have particularly enjoyed, and how you have grown closer to God as a result. So be prepared to share! We also encourage you to do these together as a family and hold one another accountable for growing in holiness at home.

# The Divine Mercy Chaplet

## 1. Using regular rosary beads, start with the Sign Of The Cross:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

## 2. On the first single bead say the Opening Prayer:

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!  
(repeat this sentence 3x)

## 3, 4, 5. On the next group of three beads, say the Our Father at the first bead, the Hail Mary on the second, and Apostles' Creed on the third.

**Our Father:** Our Father, Who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

**Hail Mary:** Hail Mary full of Grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed are thou among women and blessed is the fruit of thy womb Jesus. Holy Mary Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

**The Apostles' Creed:** I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended into hell; the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from thence he shall come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting. Amen.

## 6. For every subsequent single bead pray the "Eternal Father" Prayer:

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

## 7. On every bead in the groups of 10, pray the "Sorrowful Passion" Prayer:


For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

## 8. Once you've gone around the whole ring of beads pray the "Holy God" Prayer three times and then the Closing Prayer.

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

### Closing Prayer

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion — inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. Amen.



# The Rosary

## 1. Using regular rosary beads, start with the Sign Of The Cross and pray the Apostles' Creed

## 2. On the first single bead say the Our Father:

## 3. On the next three beads, pray the Hail Mary on each for an increase in Faith, Hope, and Love.

## 4. Between the set of three and the next single bead, pray the Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer.

Glory Be: Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit, as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Fatima Prayer: O My Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell, lead all souls to heaven, especially those in most need of Thy mercy.

## 5. Announce the First Mystery to me meditated on during the next set of 10 beads and pray the Our Father.

## 6. Pray a Hail Mary on each bead in the set of ten while meditating on the Mystery.

## 7. Pray the Glory Be and the Fatima Prayer.

## 8. Announce the next Mystery, pray the Our Father and continue as before.

## 9. Conclude by praying the Hail Holy Queen and Closing Prayer.

Hail, holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs mourning and weeping in this valley of tears. Turn then, most gracious advocate, thine eyes of mercy toward us, and after this our exile show us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus. O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray. O God, whose only begotten Son, by His life, death, and resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal salvation. Grant, we beseech Thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, that we may both imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through Christ our Lord. Amen.



# Christian Service

## What are the service requirements?

Perform *at least* 3 Corporal Works of Mercy and 3 Spiritual Works of Mercy that benefit individuals who are truly in need of that service and then fill in a reflection sheet in your Confirmation Record Booklet for each Work of Mercy you perform.

## Why should I do service during Confirmation prep?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that preparation for Confirmation should help enable a Christian to assume the apostolic responsibilities of the Christian life (CCC #1309). Further, it is the Church's responsibility to discern whether or not a person is responsive to God's grace and suitably prepared to receive Confirmation by looking for signs in that person's life; one of which is manifested by our acts of charity and serving those in need.

## How are these service expectations different?

These service expectations are different because 1) you're not counting hours and 2) the service you perform must help someone in need by fulfilling one of the Works of Mercy. Christian service is about deliberate moments of compassion performed out of love for those who are in *real need*. In this way we encounter Christ in those whom we serve and bring the love of Christ to them through our actions. For this reason, each act of service you perform should fall under one of the Corporal or Spiritual Works of Mercy in some way. Volunteering to pick up trash at a local park is nice and should be done, but it's not a Work of Mercy. On the other hand, taking time to sit and visit with an elderly neighbor who may be lonely would definitely qualify!

The Works of Mercy are things that we should naturally do as Christians. This is meant to help you recognize and reflect, and act upon those things in your life.

## What are the Works of Mercy?

### ***Corporal Works of Mercy***

Feed the hungry  
Give drink to the thirsty  
Clothe the naked  
Shelter the homeless  
Visit the sick  
Visit the imprisoned  
Bury the dead

### ***Spiritual Works of Mercy***

Instruct the ignorant  
Counsel the doubtful  
Admonish the sinner  
Bear wrongs patiently  
Forgive offenses willingly  
Comfort the sorrowful  
Pray for the living & dead

# Christian Service

The Corporal works of Mercy are taken from the Gospel of Matthew, where Jesus tells of how the righteous are ushered in to eternal life because of the merciful deeds they performed in Faith for those in need, and the Book of Tobit where he performs many charitable acts for his people including burying their dead with respect.

“Then the king will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father. Inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me.' “

Matthew 25:34-36

The Spiritual Works of Mercy are taken from an assortment of verses throughout all of scripture and have been a part of the Tradition of the Catholic Church since the beginning.

## **How do I go about doing these acts of service?**

The following pages list several ideas and organizations in our area where you may be able to fulfill your service obligations. This is by no means an exhaustive list. It is meant to give you some ideas. Do your own research, find a way that you can help someone in need, *directly or indirectly*.

Some things, you can do on your own throughout the course of your daily life. Other things will require that you make a phone call and set up a time to go and serve at a particular organization or ministry.

## **Can you give us an example of how to fulfill this requirement?**

Sure! It could look something like this:

1. Called a food bank and helped sort food with my parents on a Saturday—*Feed the Hungry*
2. Visited a nursing home and played games with the residents—*Visit the sick/imprisoned*
3. Helped Helping Hands (St. Monica’s Ministry that hosts a funeral reception)—*Bury the Dead*
4. Prayed in the Adoration Chapel for my family and friends—*Pray for the living and the dead*
5. Tutored younger students after school—*Instruct the ignorant*
6. Stood up for a kid at school who was being made fun of—*Admonish the sinner*

## *Works of Mercy Ideas*

Here are a few examples and ideas for performing the corporal and spiritual works of mercy . This list is by no means extensive. Try and think of other ways where you might be able to bring the love of God to people in need, either directly or indirectly. Feeding the hungry can be handing a bowl of soup to a homeless man, but it can also be deliberately collecting canned goods from your neighbors to donate to Vision Food Share. Being a good listener for a friend who had a bad day can be just as meaningful as spending time with someone who recently lost a loved one.

- Encourage someone by your words or by sending them a card who may be grieving.
- Practice being a good listener.

#### **Admonish the Sinner**

- Speak up when your friends are doing things you know are wrong.
- Stand up for someone who is being picked on or bullied.

#### **Bear Wrongs Patiently**

- Try to control your anger or frustration.
- Choose to avoid gossip when the opportunity to participate in it arises.

#### **Forgive Offenses Willingly**

- Don't hold a grudge.
- Make amends with a sibling you may have fought with.
- Forgive a friend who may have done something to hurt your relationship.

#### **Pray For The Living And The Dead**

- Pray for an end to abortion as a family outside of an abortion center for an hour.
- Look in the obituaries for people who may have died without any family and attend their funeral.
- Spend time in the Chapel in Eucharistic Adoration praying for others.
- Deliberately offered up the grace you receive at Mass for the benefit of someone else.
- Visit a cemetery and lay flowers at the graves and say a prayer for the repose of the souls of the people buried there.
- Pray a Rosary or Divine Mercy Chaplet for someone you know, for people in war

# Reconciliation

## Why Must I Go To Confession Before Being Confirmed?

“To receive Confirmation one must be in a state of grace. One should receive the sacrament of Penance in order to be cleansed for the gift of the Holy Spirit.”

- Catechism of the Catholic Church #1310

## Why is the Sacrament of Reconciliation Important?

No matter how alienated we feel because of our sins, in the Sacrament of Penance, we are concretely, surely reconciled with Christ and His Church. Through the priest, we get to experience God’s mercy, love, and peace. Getting into the habit of going to Confession once a month whether we have committed a serious sin or not helps us stay on track in our relationship with Him. But at the minimum, we should confess whenever we commit a mortal sin, or once a year and before receiving a Sacrament such as Confirmation.

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## *Confirmation Dress*

Girls are to wear modest dress attire. They may wear any color of dress and can also wear a pant suit, if they wish.

Boys should wear a black or navy suit or sport coat and tie. Boys should also wear dressy shoes and no tennis shoes.

## *Mass Attendance*

### **Why is the Eucharist the source and summit of our Christian life?**

It is the source of the Christian life, “because whoever shares in it receives the motivation and strength to live as a true Christian” and it is the summit “because the faithful bring to it all their prayers and good works, their joys and sufferings. These modest offerings are united to the perfect sacrifice of Christ. Thus they are completely sanctified and lifted up to God in an act of perfect worship which brings the faithful into the divine intimacy.”

- St. Pope John Paul II

### **Why must I attend Mass every Sunday?**

Since Confirmation unites us more firmly to Christ and renders our bond with the Church more perfect (Catechism #1303) it is critical that we maintain that bond and unity and fulfill God’s commandment to “keep holy the Sabbath” by attending Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation.

At the Last Supper, Christ commanded that we “do this in remembrance” of him and St. Paul wrote in his first letter to the Corinthians that “as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes” (1 Cor. 11:26).

It is expected then that all Confirmation candidates attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation. Gathering together as the Body of Christ and participating in communal worship of our Lord while uniting ourselves to Jesus through receiving his Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity in the Eucharist is at the very heart of what it means to be a Christian.

# Sponsor

## **Why must I choose a sponsor for Confirmation?**

The Confirmation sponsor is someone who will serve as a positive Catholic role model to help you grow in your faith and who will present you to the bishop during the Confirmation ceremony. You should choose someone who is strong in their Catholic faith who can help you grow closer to God. Ask them to turn in the necessary documentation. They should attend at least the Confirmation practice and Confirmation itself, but are welcome to attend any other events or meetings as well.

## **What is the role and responsibility of a Confirmation sponsor?**

“...it is for the sponsor to see that the confirmed person acts as a true witness to Christ and faithfully fulfills the obligations connected with this sacrament” (Code of Canon Law 892). A sponsor is someone who can help the confirmation candidate grow in their faith and serve as a guide and example of Christian life.

## **What qualifications must one meet in order to be a sponsor?**

The Code of Canon Law states that one must meet the following requirements to be a sponsor:

- Be a Catholic who has received the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist.
- Be at least 16 years old
- Not be a parent of the candidate
- Be a Catholic in good standing who is not bound by any canonical penalty
- Be one who leads a life in harmony with the faith and the role to be undertaken

In order to illustrate the unity of confirmation & baptism, it is desirable that, if possible, one of the candidate's godparents also be the sponsor for confirmation, while this is not strictly necessary.

## **How are these qualifications verified?**

To verify that the above qualifications are met we ask that the person you choose to be your sponsor sign a Sponsor Covenant Form. It is imperative that sponsors fulfill the above mentioned criteria and so are asked to affirm that by signing this document. If they can not, in good conscience, sign this document, please take steps to find someone to be your sponsor who can.
